A Report on basic Hindi teaching to children of labourers engaged in construction of multi-storied flats.

<u>Introduction</u>: In our country, India, multi-storied flats are being built in cities and it generally takes 2-3 years for their completion. Labourers engaged in construction work shift to new locations or new cities after the completion of work. Children of these labourers, if staying with them, often don't go to school for their stay at any location is not long; generally one or two years; maximum three years.

SBNJEAC Trust objective is for educational activities and helping poor and needy. An experimental activity was conducted to impart knowledge of basic Hindi to the children of labourers; with the aim that the level of children can be raised above the illiterate category.

As the stay of the labourers in a working site is rather uncertain, the aim has been kept in teaching them Hindi quickly in limited time.

Background work: A multi-storied flat under construction (Solitaire Crown, Aradhana Garden locality, GMS Road, Dehardun) was identified and its management/owners, contractors and labourers were contacted. Permission was given by the Management to make use of a small lawn in front of their office for teaching children during evening time (6 to 7 PM). Their main concern was safety i.e. no harm to come to children from any untoward accident (things falling from top of the building under construction) as the labourers would raise complaint/objection against the management.

Stationary (notebooks, pencils, erasers and pencil sharpners) were purchased. Few elementary Hindi basic books were offered by some known people. A medium size blackboard / chalks were procured. It was also decided to provide some eatables (normally biscuits packets and few times, chocolates or frooti were provided) to kids daily after the end of class.

Actual work: The teaching activity was initiated from 23rd May 2022 and conducted till 08th Aug 2022. Class was taken from 6 to 7 in the evening, by the trustee, Bhagwant S Rawat. Sunday was kept as holiday. As the children were from varying age group, and had to be taught differently, help was also taken for first two months from two poor students (Yogesh, Class 9th pass and Inder, class 12th Pass) during their summer vacation. Initially, reading and writing of Hindi letters was taught and then to higher age group, dictation of Hindi Text/words was given daily.

A report of the performance of the children taught is given in Annexure A and the photographs and Hindi writing of some children is given in Annexure B:

Expenditure: Net expenditure till date is around ₹10000 of which ₹3000/= paid to Inder/ Yogesh from Trust fund. All other expenditure is being borne by personal fund of Trustees

Lessons/observations:

- 1. This model of making children literate (knowledge of basic Hindi only) can be followed independently anywhere with very less expenditure by educated people interested in helping poor.
- 2. Children of age 6 and above have generally faster pick up to learn things from scratch and can also write properly. Small children can recognize Hindi letters but they will need much more time to write properly and hence teaching Hindi should be basically restricted to children above 6 years, when the time is limited.
- 3. Self-interest/IQ of a child is important for faster learning.
- 4. Some parents are rather apathetic to send their children to even govt. schools.

Conclusion: The activity has benefitted children and will be re-started again. It is however, in no way, substitute for school, where the children learn number of others subjects/activities, learn to put up for longer hours for studies and have benefit of interacting with a much larger group of children/ teachers.
